

Dickson Type Quick Change Tool Holder... the benefits

Technological advances often quote speed as the major benefit for spending big dollars in upgrading to the new "superfast" model. When scrutinised closely, we discover that in many cases, the time savings are measured in nano seconds. Oftentimes a user would have to spend a thousand years operating the equipment 24 hours a day to save enough time to justify the extra expense.

The Dickson Type Quick Change Tool holder does promise and deliver reasonable time savings but it also overcomes another problem... When a change of tool is required and a job is set up in the machine and is using a dead or live centre in the tailstock, then getting the new tool to be exactly on centre height *without* using the dead centre in the tailstock is not an issue.

Each tool holder with this piece of equipment comes with it's own centre height adjustment. Once obtained, the height adjusting screw is locked in place. Therefore when changing the task on a job, removing the tool and replacing it with any of the preset tool holders, the new tool is automatically returned to the exact position for the correct centre height. No adjustments necessary.

The tool holders are locked in place with a quick release lever that operates a cam lock. There is a large and small model and they accommodate 16mm and 12mm shank tooling respectively. The tool comes supplied with 3 standard tool holders plus one designed for holding a parting blade. An optional extra is an extra long tool holder that is 88mm long. Extra standard length tool holders also available on request. The Small is \$269.50 while the larger one is \$402.88 incl GST.

What lube oil should I use for my lathe

Myford have made recommendations for what lube oils to use on their machines and unless the manufacturer of your particular machine recommends otherwise, we present these to you for your consideration...

For headstock and spindle

Myford suggest ESSO NUTO H32 (H – Hydraulic 32 ISO Viscosity) Suitable alternatives include *Shell – Tellus 32, Castrol Hyspin AWH 32, BP Bartran H or HV32*

For all slide ways -

Myford suggest ESSO FEBIS K68 (K – Multi Oil 68 ISO Viscosity) Suitable Alternatives include *Shell Tonna S68, Castrol Magna Glide 68, BP Maccurat 68*

For change wheels, feedscrews and leadscrews

Suitable lubricants include Castrol Moly Grease SBX2, BP Trunnion bearing grease

Tip from Alan Taylor- excellent advice....

Every time you forward an email, there is information left over from the people who received the message before you did, namely their email addresses and names. As the messages get forwarded along, the list of addresses builds, and all it takes is for one person to get a virus, and his computer can send that virus to every email address that has come across his computer. How do you stop it? Well, there are several easy steps. Try the following if you haven't done it before:

- 1. When you forward an email, DELETE all of the other addresses that appear in the body of the message (at the top). Highlight them and delete them, backspace them, cut them, whatever it is you know how to do. It only takes a second. You MUST click the 'Forward' button first and then you will have full editing capabilities against the body and headers of the message. If you don't click on 'Forward' first, you won't be able to edit the message at all.
- 2. Whenever you send an email to more than one person, do NOT use the To: or Cc: fields for adding email addresses. ALWAYS use the BCC(blind carbon copy) field for listing ALL the email addresses. This is the way the people you send to will only see their own email address. If you don't see your BCC: option click on where it says to: and your address list will appear. Highlight the address and choose BCC: and that's it, it's that easy. When you send to BCC your message will automatically say 'Undisclosed Recipients' in the 'TO:' field of the people who receive it.
- 3. Remove any 'FW:' in the subject line. You can re-name the subject if you wish or even fix spelling.
- 4. ALWAYS hit your Forward button from the actual email you are reading. (You may have had to open numerous other pages before you got to the real forwarded message. Ever get those emails that you have to open 10 pages to read the one page with the information on it? Forwarding from the actual page you wish someone to view, you stop them from having to open many emails just to see what you sent.
- 5. Have you ever gotten an email that is a petition? It states a position and asks you to add your name and address and to forward it to 10 or 15 people or your entire address book. The email can be forwarded on and on and can collect thousands of names and email addresses. The completed petition is actually worth a couple of bucks to a professional spammer because of the wealth of valid names and email addresses contained therein. DO NOT EVER put your email address on any petition. If you want to support the petition, send it as your own personal letter to the intended recipient. (And don't believe the ones that say that the email is being traced; it just ain't so!)

Some of the other emails to delete and not forward are:

- A. The one that says something like, 'Send this email to 10 people and you'll see something great happen.' Or sometimes they'll say 'something really cute will happen.' IT WON'T HAPPEN!
- B. And don't let the bad luck ones scare you either, they should get trashed.
- C. Before you forward an 'Amber Alert, or a 'Virus Alert, or some of the other emails floating around nowadays, check them out (on snopes.com/google.com) before you forward them. Most of them are junk mail that's been circling the net for YEARS! Just about everything you receive in an email that is in question can be checked out at www.snopes.com or www.factcheck.com

It's really easy to find out if it's real or not. it's not true, please don't pass it on. So please, in the future, let's stop the junk mail and the viruses.
